Happy New Year!

Greetings movie fans, and welcome to 2002.

Hopefully this year will be a little less exciting than the last one.

The year that was-

2001 was a year of change for the movie industry.

And not just September, but as we watched our way through the year the industry and films have started to shift into more interesting forms.

Let's talk about how the theater's changed. It was only the beginning of last year in which all the major chains succumbed to bankruptcy. Theaters closed, prices went up and the companies merged. We'll see what the lasting changes are. The companies certainly aren't acting any meeker: the battle between management and the projectionist union has grown so tense that federal mediators had to be called in.

The city of Boston did something of concern for late-night movie goes this year as well. The MBTA began late-night busing for the T routes that shut down after midnight. This means movie patrons of 10:00 movies actually have a chance to get home on public transportation, rather than taxis. The busing is only a year-long experiment, but let's hope it continues.

Theaters also have to change the way they charge for movies. There are now more screens than ever before, and movies are opening on more of them at once. This creates a nasty little problem for theater chains. They get more money from ticket sales as the movies stay out in circulation. Thus opening weekend mostly goes to the movie production

companies.

So you have lots and lots of expensive screens and all of them showing the new movie. Want to guess what that did to repeat business?

This summer saw the One-Weekend Wonder born out of the ashes of the summer blockbuster.

Everything from *Tomb Raider* to *American Pie 2* saw stunning drops in attendance after only one week. (almost always 50%) Basically everyone that wanted to see the film did. And with the notable exception of *Shrek*, it seemed that early this year that every movie was going to fly high and do a belly flop a week later.

Of course not every movie did that. Those with good word-of-mouth (aka GOOD films) did fine in this environment. *The Others* crept along this summer earning a very respectable amount of money and staying around for quite awhile. Other films, such as *Memento* and *Mulholland Drive* also worked their way up thanks to good impressions. (both of which are also making critic's top ten lists all over the place. and *Mul. Drive* is on a few of the worst lists as well)

Hollywood did take a couple of tiny risks and brought out two genres that have almost disappeared. One genre worked: a musical known as *Moulin Rouge*. Another genre tanked: the western that was *American Outlaws*.

As the summer ended and anticipation grew for the Winter films we were all stunned by September 11th. Some movies were pulled or pushed back in fear that the audiences no longer wanted explosions and terrorists. That proved to be a bit of an over-

Lord of the Rings: Fellowship of the Ring

Fantasy [PG-13]

It has been an excellent winter for fantasy movie fans. November had Harry Potter, and now we have Lord of the Rings. Rings is a three-hour epic with battles, betrayal, love and friendship. Just about everything you could ask for. And this is only the first of three parts!

We follow our hero, Frodo, as he brings a magical ring back to the mountain in which it was forged. Alas a supremely evil being wants the ring back so that he can rule the world, so he has sent nine undead minions out to retrieve it. It is a race as to who will get the ring, and be able to resist the temptation to use it. The Fellowship mentioned in the title actually forms about halfway through the film and consists of Frodo, his friends Samwise, Merry and Pippin plus five guardians: Two human warriors, a dwarf, an elf and a wizard. As the travel on they



must not only escape the riders, but also an army of orcs, goblins and a particularly nasty troll. And all throughout they all must face the temptation to steal the ring for their own ends.

This is just the barest outline of the story in this film, but the movie manages to keep the pace up very well for all of the characters, subplots and complexities it has to give out.

And what it does well it does very well. The combat scenes and special effects are spectacular. The acting is fine with the characters coming through. (even Liv Tyler does a good job)

While the movie is quite good, there are a few problems. It is an epic, so beware sore-bottoms and stiff legs when you finally get out of the theater. (Of course that also let's you finally able to finish those huge popcorns they keep trying to sell...)

The largest problem in the film is repeated elements. One of the worst clichés of the action film is the last-minute save. The killing blow comes down, goes into slow-motion or the music swells, and then “bam” the blow is blocked. It's done several times in this film, and not particularly well. Also some scenes have a little bit of déjà vu with them as well, such as the second time we see an Elvish city.

Those criticisms aside, this is a very well made film and will probably be nominated for Best Picture. It may even win it.

Vanilla Sky

Science Fiction/Drama/Thriller [R]

As you can tell by the genre listing, this film is not your average thriller. It starts off with a nightmare about a man finding himself all alone in New York, and from the moment he wakes up we try to find out what is real and what is still the dream.

Our hero David (played by Tom Cruise) is young, rich and attractive. And he's enjoying all of it. Unfortunately one night he does a love-at-first-sight with a young woman at a party, Sophia (Penelope Cruz). This upsets both his best friend, who is the young woman's date, and also David's lover (played quite well by Cameron Diaz).

By the next morning his jilted lover, Julia, has guilted him into going with her on a drive through the city, a drive that ends up going over the edge of a bridge.

David loses his good looks, and possibly his sanity from the accident. Julia is deceased, and what is a dream and what isn't quickly become confused. As David tries to re-construct his life he starts seeing things. We get flashes of Sophia still around, of other places and other events. His dreams keep intersecting with reality until you're not sure where things are going next. Soon you're not even sure what is real.

This is especially true after David meets a young man who says that David has control over the whole world and everyone in it. And then, for a second, he proves it.

That is the briefest outline of the movie's plot. But I can't go too much deeper into it without giving away the surprises. It is a strange surreal trip through

dreamland, reality and all the confusion in-between. There are a lot of quick flashes to odd scenes and a few "gosh it was only a dream" scares (admittedly that's a weakness of the film, the sudden wake-ups are used too often). But the film keeps moving forward to very nice ending.

This movie has several thematic elements from Jacob's Ladder, the Matrix and Total Recall. But unlike those movies, Vanilla Sky isn't out to scare you. There are a few messages buried in the plot-lines and they are uplifting. What is happiness for you? What choices does that affect? And how can little decisions affect your life?

Vanilla Sky is an excellent movie, and well worth the time to see it. Cruise does an okay job acting, but the supporting cast does an excellent job. Kurt Russell does an excellent job as a prison psychologist, and Jason Lee as the best friend is surprisingly good.

Cameron Diaz may get an Oscar nod for supporting actress for this role.

Vanilla Sky is worth seeing, and worth seeing right now.

teach stupid humans that they're in trouble...) in five minutes. After that it's a chase as the humans try to get to the shore and not get eaten. This time around the problems are highly-intelligent Raptors and a bigger-than-a-T-Rex Spinosaurus. We also get to see Pteranadons for the first time in the series. That's the problem with this particular installment. It relies on the new dinosaurs as a crutch. The plotline is the same thing as the first one and part of the second. The action is fast-paced and there are some excellent fight scenes with the dinosaurs, but it does seem to be going by the numbers. The DVD (sold separately in full-screen and widescreen versions for some reason) has a fair amount of features. It has a ton of documentaries, from behind-the-scenes shots to paleontology digs. For the movie itself there is only the trailers and director's commentary. The commentary talks about the making of the movie and is fun if you like to see the makers of the film point out what's cgi and what isn't and the difficulties in mixing the two. This movie is a good buy if you love dinosaur movies or want to complete the series. Otherwise you can safely bypass it.

Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure

One of the sillier parts of the 80's Bill & Ted have finally landed in DVD format. Along with *Matrix*, this is the movie that Keannu Reeves will always be remembered for (whether he wants it or not).

The story concerns to total slackers Bill and Ted, who want to be part of a band. However, since they spend all their time playing instruments (very, very badly) they have been neglecting their schoolwork.

Now they are about to fail history.

But the night before their final report a man from the future comes to them, offering the time travel as a way to ace their report. They go back and kidnap various historical figures and have fun and excitement along the way. It's all pure silliness and worth seeing.

Unfortunately the DVD comes with bare minimum features. It's widescreen, has the trailer, and has a couple of subtitle languages. That's it. The only good thing is that it's a clean transfer and it's cheap. It is possible that sometime down the road a special edition will come out, so you may want to hold off on this. Otherwise, if you're looking for a fun movie at a cheap price this one is worth it.
