Some time ago I ran across a very interesting report from the Mormon Church.

They discovered that knocking on doors led to a conversion rate of less than 1%. If they knocked on a 1000 doors, only 1 person was converted to the Mormon faith.

However, if a member invited someone into their home and established a relationship with them, the conversion rate rose to 50%.

They discovered that there is a powerful connection between evangelism and personal relationships and your own home. (For more information on this topic see [The Jesus Habits](#) by Jay Dennis.)

It's not surprising that the early church made their homes a hub for their evangelism.

I would encourage you to read a few examples from scriptures and see what happened when homes were available for evangelism: (see Acts 2:42-47, Acts 5:42, Acts 10:24ff, Acts 20:20, and Luke 5:29). All of this begs the question, "What about *our* homes?"

Have we made them available for Christ and His redemptive mission?

William Barclay said, "Christianity is the religion of the open door." Can this be said of us?

On a personal note, I was saved in June of 1977.

I was born again in a summer camp in West Virginia.

Just a few days before I went to camp, I was in the home of a member of the church where I grew up. I had a very good dinner that night and I remember that after dinner, that family shared with me the joys of being a Christian.

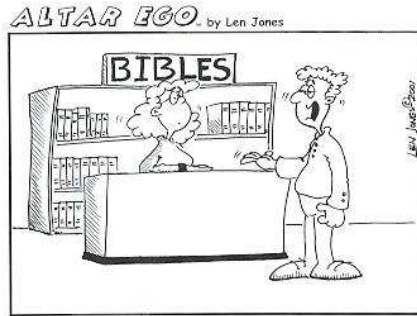
It was a memorable occasion and I can safely say it paved the way for me to come to know Christ just a few days later.

Environmental Tips

from the Social Concerns Committee

Below are some environmental tips published by the North Carolina Wildlife Federation. Read over the tips and find out how you can help preserve our world for future generations!

- 1) Recycle newspapers, aluminum, glass, and tin.
- 2) Use cloth diapers.
- 3) Reuse egg cartons and paper bags.
- 4) Avoid foam packaging in egg cartons, disposable picnic items, etc.
- 5) Use rags instead of paper towels.
- 6) Use cloth napkins instead of paper ones.
- 7) Mend and repair, rather than discard and replace.
- 8) Buy bulk and unpackaged, rather than packaged goods.
- 9) Buy goods in reusable or recyclable containers.
- 10) Use non-toxic pest control.
- 11) Compost your food scraps.
- 12) Install a water-saving showerhead in your bathroom.
- 13) Keep hazardous waste in spill proof containers.
- 14) Turn off water while you brush your teeth.
- 15) Don't leave water running when washing dishes.
- 16) Put a water conservation device in your toilet tank. (A plastic bottle filled with water is the simplest and cheapest one)
- 17) Hang your clothes to dry.
- 18) Be sure your home is tight and well insulated.
- 19) Heat and cool your home responsibly.
- 20) Turn off lights when not in use.
- 21) Turn down your hot water heater. Insulate your hot water heater.
- 22) Take shorter showers.
- 23) Buy energy efficient electrical appliances.
- 24) Conserve gas by walking, bicycling, and carpooling.
- 25) Use rechargeable batteries.
- 26) Teach your children to be environmentally aware and responsible.
- 27) Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways.
- 28) Snip six-pack rings before discarding.
- 29) Aerate your faucets. "Low flow aerators" are available at hardware stores.
- 30) Use a reusable coffee filter or unbleached coffee filters.
- 31) Use reusable containers.
- 32) Clean or replace air filters every month. Otherwise the fan has to work harder and consumes more energy.
- 33) When washing clothes, wait until you have a full load to wash.
- 34) Clean your dryer's lint trap after every load to keep the air circulating efficiently.
- 35) Use string grocery bags instead of plastic or paper.
- 36) Avoid using flea collars on your pet- add brewer's yeast and garlic to your pet's food instead. Fleas hate it!

The day is over, you are driving home. You tune in your radio. You hear a little blurb about a little village in Mexico where some villagers have died suddenly, strangely, of a flu that has never been seen before. Three of four people are dead, and its kind of interesting, and they are sending some doctors over there to investigate it.

You don't think much about it, but on Sunday, coming home from church, you hear another radio spot. Only they say its not three villagers, its 30,000 villagers in the back hills of this particular area of Mexico, and it's on TV that night. CNN runs a little blurb. People are heading there from the disease center in Atlanta because this disease strain has never been seen before.

By Monday morning when you get up, its the lead story. For its not just Mexico. Its Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iran and before you know it, you're hearing this story everywhere and they have coined it now as "the mystery flu." The President has made some comment that he and everyone are praying and hoping that all will go well over there. But everyone is wondering, "How are we going to contain it?" That's when the President of France makes an announcement that shocks Europe. He is closing their borders. No flights from Mexico, Pakistan, or any of the countries where this thing has been seen.

And that's why that night you are watching a little bit of CNN before going to bed. Your jaw hits your chest when a weeping woman is translated from a French news program into English. There's a man lying in a hospital in Paris dying of the mystery flu. It has come to Europe. Panic strikes. As best they can tell, once you get it you have it for a week before you know it. Then you have four days of unbelievable symptoms. And then you die.

Britain closes its borders, but its too late. South Hampton, Liverpool, North Hampton and it's Tuesday morning when the President of the United States makes the following announcement. "Due to a national security risk, all flights to and from Europe and Asia have been canceled. If your loved ones are overseas, I'm sorry. They cannot come back until we find a cure for this thing." Within four days our nation has been plunged into an unbelievable fear. People are talking about "What if it comes to this country"? And preachers on Tuesday are saying "It's the scourge of God."

It's Wednesday night and you are at a church prayer meeting when somebody runs if from the parking lot and yells, "Turn on a radio, turn on a radio!" And while the church listens to a little transistor radio with a microphone stuck up to it, the announcement is made. Two women are lying in a Long Island hospital dying from the mystery flu. Within hours it seems, this thing just sweeps across the country.

People are working around the clock trying to find an antidote. Nothing is working. California, Oregon, Arizona, Florida, Massachusetts. It's as though it's just sweeping in from the borders. And then all of a sudden the news comes out. The code has been broken. A cure can be found. A vaccine can be made. It's going to take the blood of somebody who hasn't been infected and so, sure enough, all through the Midwest, through all those channels of emergency broadcasting, everyone is asked to do one simple thing. Go to your downtown hospital and have your blood type taken. That's all we ask of you. When you hear the sirens go off in your neighborhood, please make your way quickly, quietly and safely, to the hospitals.

Sure enough, when you and your family get down there late on that Friday night, there is a long line and they've got nurses and doctors coming out and pricking fingers and taking blood and putting labels on it. Your spouse and your kids are out there, and they take your blood type and they say, "wait here in the parking lot and if we call your name you can be dismissed and go home." You stand around, scared, with your neighbors, wondering what in the world is going on and if this is the end of the World.

Suddenly a young man comes running out of the hospital screaming. He's yelling a name and waving a clipboard. What? He yells it again! And your son tugs on your jacket and says, "That's me."

Before you know it, they have grabbed your boy. "Wait a minute. Hold on!" And they say, Its okay, his blood is clean. His blood is pure. We want to make sure he doesn't have the disease. We think he has got the right type. Five tense minutes later, out come the doctors and nurses crying and hugging one another-some are even laughing. It's the first time you have seen anybody laugh in a week, and an old doctor walks up to you and says, "Thank you. Your son's blood type is perfect. It's clean, it is pure, and we can make the vaccine."

As the word begins to spread all across that parking lot full of folks, people are screaming and praying and laughing and crying. But then the gray-haired doctor pulls you aside and says, "May we see you for a moment? We didn't realize that the donor would be a minor and we need.....we need you to sign a consent form."

You begin to sign and then you see that the number of pints of blood to be taken is empty. "H-h-h-ow many pints?" And that is when the old doctor's smile fades and he says, "We had no idea it would be a little child. We weren't prepared. We need it all!"

"But-but. . . I don't understand. He's my only son!"

"We are talking about the world here. Please sign. We-We need it all!"

"But can't you give him a transfusion?"

"If we had clean blood we would. Please, will you please sign?"

In numb silence you do. Then they say, "would you like to have a moment with him before we begin?" Could you walk back? Could you walk back to that room where he sits on a table saying, "Daddy? Mommy? What's going on?" Could you take his hands and say, "Son, we love you and we would never ever let anything happen to you that didn't just have to be. Do you understand that?"

And when that old doctor comes back in and says, "I'm sorry, we've got to get started. People all over the world are dying." Could you leave? Could you walk out while he is saying, "Dad? Mom? Dad? Why. . . why are you leaving me?"

And then next week, when they have the ceremony to honor your son, and some folks sleep through it, and some folks don't even bother to come because they have better things to do, and some folks come with just a pretentious smile and just pretend to care. Would you want to jump up and say, "EXCUSE ME! MY SON DIED FOR YOU! MY ONLY SON! DON'T YOU EVEN CARE? DOES IT MEAN NOTHING TO YOU?"

I wonder, is that what God wants to say?

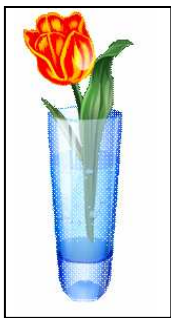

This involves learning to put Jesus first in our thoughts and actions. Service projects will be infused into the lessons we are learning.

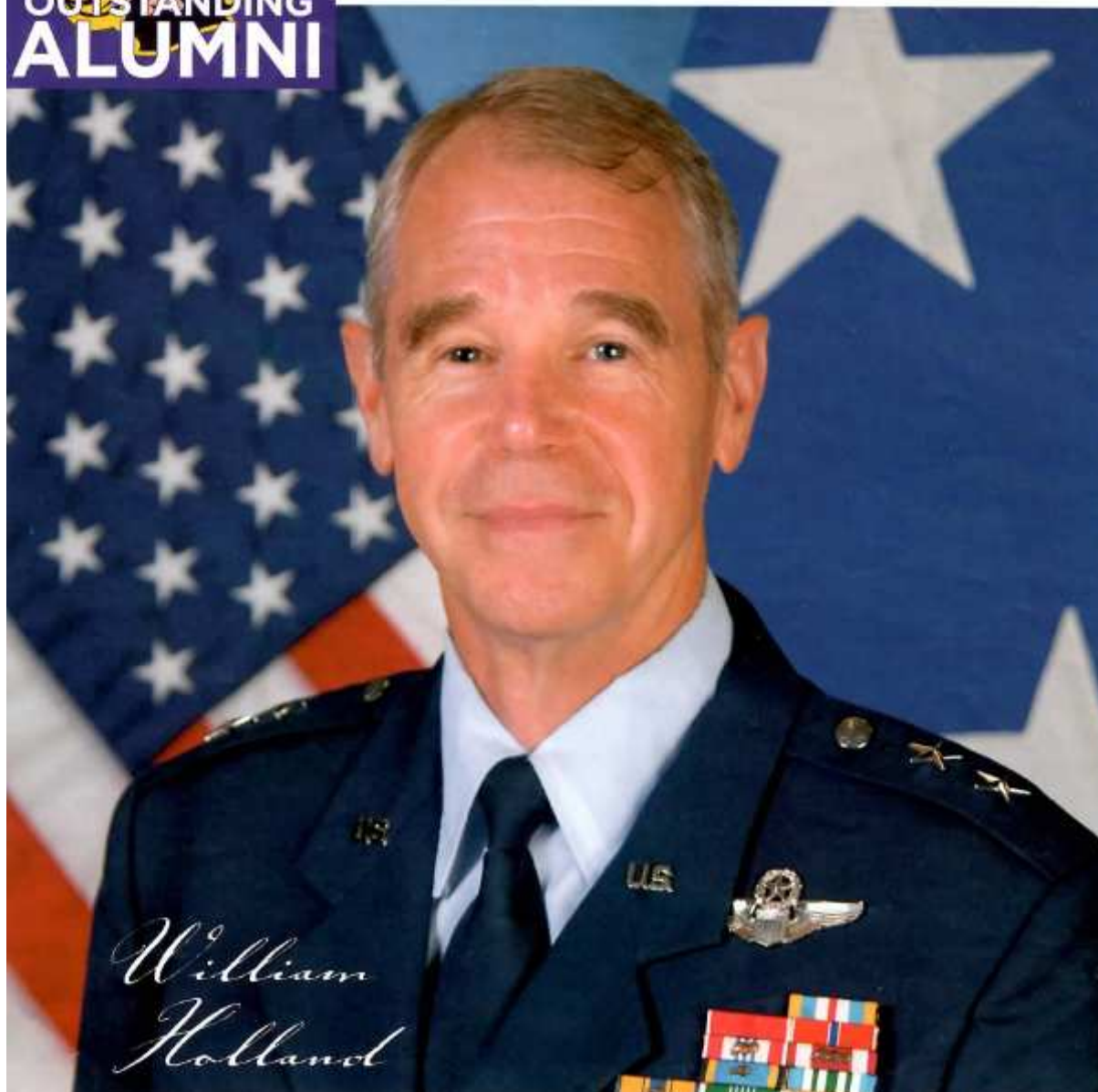

Major General William "Dutch" L. Holland '75 is Commander, 9th Air Force, Air Combat Command, Shaw Air Force Base, SC. The 9th Air Force comprises six wings in the eastern United States and two direct reporting units with more than 350 aircraft, and 24,000 active-duty and civilian personnel. The command is also responsible for the operational readiness of 149th Air Force-gained National Guard and Air Force Reserve units.

Maj. Gen. Holland entered the Air Force in 1976 after receiving his commission through the ROTC program at East Carolina. He has commanded at the squadron, group and wing levels, and has served in several joint and Air Staff assignments. These include

Combined Forces Command/United Nation Command, South Korea; Headquarters U.S. Atlantic Command; Headquarters U.S. Central Command; and the NATO Balkans Combined Air Operations Center during the Operation Allied Force Kosovo air campaign and Joint Task Force 170, Haiti.

Prior to assuming his current position, Maj. Gen. Holland was the Vice Commander, 9th Air Force, and Deputy Commander, U.S. Air Forces Central at Shaw Air Force Base. He is a command pilot with 2,500 flying hours. 🇺🇸

October 4, 2009 (*Pending Approval of the Meeting*)

Nahunta Friends Meeting met for the regular monthly business session after morning worship on October 4, 2009 with Clerk Gary Radford presiding. Forty were present. Paul Aycock gave the opening prayer.

The minutes of the last meeting were approved and recorded as read.

For the trustees Keith Jackson reported that the committee doesn't have estimates for redoing the restrooms in the back of the meetinghouse. Thad's Carpet has given an estimate of a little more than \$7700 to replace the carpet upstairs with vinyl that looks like wood. Jump for Jesus (youth group) has \$1000 from earlier fundraisers.
