Research Experience

Since 1977 I have been engaged in anthropological research. My primary research has included fieldwork in Mexico and Central America that encompasses ethnographic and ethnohistoric data collection in local communities in western Honduras and highland Guatemala. My research in Guatemala and Mexico concerns human rights issues of indigenous peoples and an examination of the dramatic transformations within indigenous Maya society and culture in the past 25 years. More recently, my research interests concern increasing globalization which especially its effects on the social construction of gender. This research has been funded largely by the MacArthur Interdisciplinary Program on Peace and International Cooperation and Professional Improvements Grants from Metropolitan State University. My research has resulted in four books and numerous scholarly articles.

I also have planned, organized and implemented research in ecclesiastical and secular archives as well as historical and museum research in national and international collections. My dissertation research benefited from research at the Tozzer Library, Harvard University, the St. Raymond Nonnatus Seminary, Order of Mercedarians, LeRoy, New York and ecclesiastical archives in Comayagua, Honduras and Guatemala City, Guatemala. Research sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities concerned an examination of Lenca Indian material culture at the Research Branch of the Museum of the American Indian, Heye Foundation in New York. In addition, I have participated in archaeological fieldwork in Guatemala and Honduras, and served as an assistant and supervisor for the New York State Museum and Science Service as part of their public archaeology survey program.
